


VCSE Assembly update, December 2022

- Grow and enable volunteering for the ICS.
- Build VCSE sector capacity & capability through practical advice, support & training.
- Advocate widely on behalf of the sector and supporting sector collaboration.
- Raise awareness of and support the sector to access funding and income sources.
- Support the sector to maximise funding to provide sustainability and resilience.
- Provide financial support to VCSE organisations seeking to grow, expand or innovate their services.
- Provide opportunities for the sector to meet & collaborate for peer to peer support, and share insights.

- Develop innovative engagement mechanisms to connect the sector into the ICS, focused on health inequalities and prevention developed at system, place and neighbourhood levels of our ICS.
- Increase the influence and participation of the sector in the collaborative design and innovative delivery of health and care services within the ICS.
- Lead development of a MoU between ICS partners based on 5 priority areas of; equal partnering, sustainable resourcing, digital integration, data sharing & consistent evidence and evaluation.

- Lead a system-wide approach to developing and sustaining effective social prescribing.
- Collaboratively develop a new approach to health and social care VCSE commissioning.

The collective ambition is to embed effective collaboration and partnership working between all ICS partners. Closer working will support us to achieve our shared goals and priorities, and enable our ICS to harness the expertise, insight and innovation of the VCSE sector.

N&W needs a VCSE sector that is vibrant, sustainable and resilient, is seen and treated as an equal partner and fully integrated into our ICS at system, place and neighbourhood levels.

Our first 12 months

- Working with local organisations to provide support around 'understanding your value'
- Supporting our ICS partners to understand the value of the VCSE
- Advocating a shared language around value and impact
- Promoting the VCSE as trusted and robust partners across the ICS
- Communication and engagement across Place based structures and the wider ICS

Overarching pieces of work

- Collective ambition commitments through a co-produced communication and engagement strategy
- Monthly themed events using online comment boards, design challenge resources, co-creation sessions, story boards, visiting speakers, learning zones, practical resources and visits outside of our county
- Promote the MoU with VCSE and statutory partners, likely to have some specific task and finish groups

VCSE sector member on the ICB Finance Committee, Lucy de Las Casas



Lucy de Las Casas, Director of Development at Voluntary Norfolk

I am really pleased to be a voluntary sector representative on the ICB's Finance Committee. I'm passionate about the role that VCSEs can play in health and social care, particularly working in communities and on prevention and early intervention.

As the ICS takes shape, VCSE engagement and partnership is crucial and I was keen to be part of this. I'm interested in the way that systems work and change, and this was an opportunity to engage at a system level and to bring knowledge of the VCSE sector and a different perspective.

I was assured that this was what was wanted, and not a financial qualification! I hope I can bring back to the VCSE sector a greater understanding of the ICS system, its pressures and priorities, and that this can inform how we engage productively so that all the offerings, skills and knowledge of our sector can contribute to improving lives in Norfolk and Waveney.

How can you get involved?

As part of the ICS work to strengthen the Clinical and Care Professional (CCP) voice for the Norfolk and Waveney system, we are in the process of establishing a new consultative forum, the CCP Assembly. This will act as a diverse critical friend for the Integrated Care Board (ICB) and Integrated Care Partnership (ICP) through which to sense-check ideas, plans and decisions made by the ICB which may affect the delivery, development and future clinical and care provision.

We are aiming to have a diverse group of colleagues from various different professions and sectors including both VCSE and private care providers if we can.

From across the NHS, we have one GP, two nurses, two Allied Health Professionals, one Medical Director, one healthcare scientist, one community pharmacist, one hospital consultant, one junior doctor, and one mental health professional.

From the county councils, the Director of Public Health from Norfolk has also kindly agreed to join the assembly and she brings welcome Public Health support as well as continuity from the previous Clinical Care Transformation Group (the CCTG). We also have two social workers from Norfolk county council and are awaiting a nomination from Suffolk county council.

But, the CCP is now looking for professionals drawn from either the private and or VCSE community care sectors.

The commitment is to attend a 90 minute meeting once a month. There will be some reading to do as well but including the meeting, the absolute maximum time needed would be up to 4 hours per month (for the CCPA meetings and reading and preparation time in case of ad hoc emails etc). Please note, that we are not expecting members to act as a representative for their individual organisation or role, but to draw on their skills and experience, independently of their professional, organisational or hierarchical position. However, we have also tried to draw individuals from across the whole of our patch, and to be as inclusive as possible.

We are planning to hold the first CCP Assembly meeting in January and would like to finalise the full membership before the Christmas break. If this is of interest to you then please email emma.ratzer@accessct.org by Thursday 15th December.
